Subject: ICO's request for consideration of the coffee sector in negotiations on US import tariffs

Dear Mr Secretary,

The International Coffee Organization (ICO) is the only global intergovernmental organization concerning coffee, bringing together the major coffee producing countries covering 93% of coffee production and many important consuming countries and regions, representing 63% of consumption in the world.

As the Trump Administration implements the America First Trade Policy agenda and advances with trade policies that benefit the US, US Consumers and the US economy, we welcome your openness to receiving our information about coffee's direct and indirect benefits to the US, US coffee drinkers and workers and to the US economy.

We are confident that the Administration will find that coffee is not a product of unfair or non-reciprocal trade. Coffee is mainly an import product to the US, given that there is no domestic alternative for coffee production in the US due to climatical circumstances (except and with respect to areas in Hawaii and Puerto Rico). Moreover, coffee is the US's favourite beverage, consumed daily by two thirds of adult Americans. With its proven positive health impact, coffee is not replaceable by any other drink in the US. In this context, the ICO believes that the tariffs proposed under the America First policy, could significantly harm the US coffee economy and consumers. The ICO is also concerned about interruption of the very positive impact that the US has had via its coffee imports on the wellbeing and stability of communities of coffee producers in your coffee-supplying regions.

Considering that the US is the single biggest market globally for coffee, with 15.2% of world's coffee consumption and an import value of \$7.4 billion, the scale of the impact of the imposed tariffs (of on average 20%) will be very significant. Furthermore, with \$300 million daily spent on coffee by consumers in the US, the decrease in consumption following price increases of



coffee will very likely be considerable, exacerbating the already existing high prices of coffee today. Hence, the US coffee industry, adding a value of \$343 billion to the US economy annually, both directly (by its activities of shipping, storing, roasting, branding and distributing coffee) and indirectly, supporting 2,2 million jobs in the US, will be negatively impacted.

Coffee is produced by 25 million smallholders providing employment to at least 100 million rural people in Central America and the Caribbean, South America, Asia and the Pacific, and Africa. Coffee is the motor of economically thriving and socially stable communities in these regions. Whereas the US has had an acknowledgeable positive and stabilizing impact on these origins by the simple act of trading coffee, the possible disruptive effect on coffee producing countries of the import tariffs of between 10% and 47% is undeniable.

On behalf of our Members and especially on behalf of our coffee producing Members, in favour of the vibrant US coffee economy and its coffee consumers and taking into consideration the stability and economic growth of coffee smallholder communities, we respectfully request that the Administration consider the important role of the coffee sector during further negotiations on the proposed tariffs, including the potential for a reduction, or elimination of these tariffs.

For your ease we add in the annex an overview of ICO's coffee producing Members that would be subject to import tariffs for their coffee exports to the US.

We avail ourselves of this opportunity to renew the assurances of our highest consideration.


